Students of the world are recipients and co-constructors of that knowledge, regardless of the circumstances through which they traverse, such as war AND peace. Art educators, regardless of their circumstances, are the other side of that discourse.

Support for art educators, especially those who are front and center during off-balance local or global situations, is essential in nurturing the next generation of artists and creative thinkers. Such support involves recognizing the value of arts education in fostering holistic develop-



ment, promoting cultural diversity, and enhancing problem-solving skills. As such and in light of tragic violence occurring across the globe, USSEA would like to reiterate the following message:

"The United States Society for Education Through Art actively advocates for human rights, equality, and diversity in our schools, museums, and other educational settings. The murder of George Floyd by Minneapolis police officers condemned globally and all past incidents of racism, anti-Blackness, and other forms of discrimination are violations of human rights that demise humanities and the fundamentals of our democratic society."

As a professional association of art educators, USSEA supports and advocates the following:

- Support racial justice and equity of Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC)

- Remove and counteract systemic discrimination and violence on the basis of race, gender, sexual orientation, age, disability, and other social identities



- Care and support the victims, their families, and communities due to police violence and other physical and emotional violence

- Create, develop, and implement art education resources to support diversity, equity, inclusion.

2024 USSEA Edwin Ziegfeld Awards

USSEA's Annual Edwin Ziegfeld Awards honor distinguished leaders who have made significant contributions to the National and International fields of art education. Two Ziegfeld Awards will be presented during the National Art Education Conference to be held in Minneapolis, MN, on April 4-6, 2024.

- One national award to honor an art educator from within the United States
- One international award to honor a colleague from outside the United States who has made contributions of INTERNATIONAL significance to art education

Nominations: Nominations may be submitted by any member of USSEA, InSEA, or NAEA. Forms are available at the USSEA website at <u>http://ussea.net.</u>

Eligibility: Nominees must be members of USSEA or InSEA and persons who have brought distinction to international aspects of art education through an exceptional and continuous record of achievement in scholarly writing, research, professional leadership, teaching, professional service, or community service bearing on international education in the visual arts.

The USSEA Award for Excellence in PK-12 Art Education

The USSEA Award is presented to a Pk-12 art educator who has demonstrated leadership in and commitment to multicultural and cross-cultural educational strategies in their school(s) and communities. This art educator actively implements an approach that builds respect for human dignity and diversity through art. The teacher must be a member of NAEA and USSEA to be recognized for their contributions. Their work must be confluent with the mission of USSEA, which is to foster "teamwork, collaboration, and communication among diverse constituencies in order to achieve greater understanding of the social and cultural aspects of art and visual culture in education."

The USSEA Award for Outstanding Student Project/Thesis/Dissertation

The USSEA graduate award is presented to a graduate whose thesis or creative component reflects the mission of USSEA: to foster teamwork, collaboration, and communication among diverse constituencies in order to achieve greater understanding of the social and cultural aspects of the arts and visual culture in education. The topic investigated in the master's work promotes pluralistic perspectives, deepens human and cultural understanding, and/or builds respect for diverse learners.

The InSEA World Congress took place in September 4th-6th, 2023 in Canakkale, Turkey. It was well attended, with people from fifty different countries and 37 representatives from the USA, some ofwhomare also part of USSEA.





We had three days of Keynote speakers (Inci Eviner, Kit Wise, Sarah Burkhardt, and Mira Kallo-Tavin, from Unversity of Georgia in the US) as well as individual presentations on art education, art making, and local culture, local art. The conference hosts treated attendies to multiple cultural events and excursions to provide the oppotunity to socially network and enjoy everything Turkey had to offer. Many of us also had the opportunity to exerience off-site field trips including a visit to the Museum of Troy.
